## SOME ASPECTS OF DOLPHIN BEHAVIOR IN CAPTIVITY

Dolphins in captivity exhibit peculiar behavior in two situations as follows: (1) dure heavy shower and (2) in the last minutes of life before death from pneumonia. In the for case the dolphins (*Tursiops truncatus*) displays some peculiar respiration pattern. Dure heavy shower, the dolphin surfaces to inhale and exhale in an almost vertical position togethe streams of rain. The animal starts to exhale before the blowhole emerges from the way. As a result, a white water cupola is formed behind the dolphin's back. The moment blowhole emerges from the water, the dolphin inhales. In the second situation a wild Ture truncatus or Delphinus delphis does not react to an approaching human, reaches the shuwater to lie down on the bottom so that the blowhole can remain in the air. If the dolphinushed down, it describes a circle to get back to the shore. This behavior accounts to appearance of dolphins on baches and their throwing themselves ashore.
